

vote of the membership, it was moved "That FFCV proceed with the plans to become a 501C3." The motion subsequently was adopted. Since the meeting Rob has been spending considerable time and effort on making this happen. In working on this, Rob has determined our organization will need to be reorganized and our bylaws significantly amended. The reorganization primarily is a paper exercise and will not have much impact on how we operate or greatly affect the general membership. Rob submitted the appropriate paperwork and "The Friendship Force of Central Virginia" (FFCV, Inc.) was incorporated on June 11, 2015. As per the Board of Director's (BOD's) plan, FFCV, Inc. will remain and operate as a "shell" corporation. The FFCV Unincorporated (the current FFCV organization) BOD is in the process of completing decisions regarding the full structure and related matters that will become part of FFCV, Inc. in the near future. Once the above transition decisions are finalized, we will basically merge FFCV Unincorporated into FFCV, Inc.; amend the VA incorporation documents to reflect the transition decisions; and continue forward only with FFCV, Inc. We will then move forward with the IRS Sec501(c)(3) process using FFCV, Inc. I recognize this sounds a bit confusing, and will be explained fully as we go along. If you have any questions, please contact me, Rob, or other BOD members.

Our next inbound exchange will be in approximately three months with 17 members of the Friendship Force of Santa Barbara, California visiting us in early October. Paul Hokanson, our Exchange Director, and his committee have done a great job planning this exchange and have put together a very nice agenda for our visitors. The Santa Barbara folks asked to come here primarily to see our scenery and trees, since as you probably know there is not much of anything growing that is green in California these days. So in addition to a trip to Monticello, we will be taking them to Luray Cavern with the return trip via Skyline Drive, a trip to the Frontier Culture Museum in Staunton with lunch at the Blue Ridge Parkway, a free day with optional side trips with hosts, and both welcome and farewell dinners hosted by members at Lake Monticello. Hopefully the weather will cooperate so we'll be able to take our quests for boat trips at one of these events. Great job Paul! Also, my sincere thanks to Dee & Bob Schwagerl, Walt O'Connell, Monica Notaro, Deborah Winslow, Pam Hokanson, and my wife Linda for being on Paul's committee and providing him excellent support. Also, my thanks to all of you who volunteered to home and day host during this exchange, I'm sure you will all enjoy being part of this exchange. Later in this Ambassador you will find an interesting article originally written by Friendship Force of Long Island that gives some good tips on being a home host. Good info for all of us.

From the East

Take 64 West to Exit 107 and follow signs to Crozet. At 3rd traffic signal, turn left onto 240 into Crozet. At 4 way Stop sign by BP station, go straight thru and road becomes 810. Follow 810 to Piedmont Store. This makes a little jog here to left and then right onto 810 heading North to White Hall Vineyard. At Breakheart Rd., turn left and follow Breakheart straight onto Sugar Ridge Rd. Go past the White Hall Vineyard and onto a gravel road. Take 1st left onto Meadow Wood Ln., past several houses and stay straight onto our driveway, (Knollwood Farm).

From Barracks Road

Take Barracks Rd. West and this becomes Garth Rd. Continue on Garth Rd to end, where you see the Piedmont Store and the White Hall Ruritan. Turn right here onto 810 North White Hall Vineyard. Serving as a Home Host?

Friendship Force Long Island (Edited for FFCV)

The most important thing to remember is that you are hosting Friendship Force members who share the same interest in learning about different cultures. They will surely enjoy their trips to the beach, museums, and nearby attractions, but meeting your friends and family and understanding your lifestyle will enrich their travel experience. Hosts might consider taking them to their place of worship, the grocery store, the library or even the post office. Walks through your neighborhood, bike rides, or a backyard barbeque with neighbors --- these everyday experiences might be the best memories of their visit to your club.

A home host provides a comfortable bed, preferably in a private room, for an ambassador throughout the duration of an exchange. You may opt to host either a couple or a single person, and may specify if you prefer to host a woman, a man, or either.

In addition to providing a place to sleep, as a host you are responsible for *providing* breakfast daily---providing, not serving. Remember, you are not a B&B. Ambassadors are to be treated as if they

were a member of your family. They are expected to serve themselves, clean up after themselves, and to assist you.

Organized activities are pre-planned by our club for most of the days of an exchange. You have the option of accompanying your ambassador(s)---with the entire group---on any or all of the days. The ambassadors have prepaid for their activities. You will need to do so, in advance as well. You are encouraged to participate in as many of the daily activities as possible, though keep in mind that this can cost you up to a hundred dollars. The more you participate, the stronger the bond you will create with your ambassadors.

If you choose to opt out of any of the day's activities, you <u>must</u> inform the day host coordinator (prior to the exchange), and a day host will be assigned to take your place. It is advisable to introduce your ambassadors to their day hosts at the welcome dinner or whenever possible at the earliest time. If you are hosting a dinner in your home, you are encouraged to invite your day host(s). It is also an opportunity to introduce friends and family to your ambassadors. It is an excellent way to expose them to the world of Friendship Force.

Expect to be asked to provide a bag lunch for your ambassador(s) for several of the days during the exchange. It is fun to involve them in preparing the bag lunches assembly line style. It is also an experience to bring them to a supermarket to select the food for the bag lunches.

Our exchanges traditionally include a welcome dinner, a farewell dinner, a mix/match dinner and maybe a dinner at a local restaurant. If you are home hosting, one member of your household is entitled to attend, at no charge, either the welcome or farewell dinner. (The ED will decide if this is one or both). It is also customary for ambassador to treat you to dinner or lunch one day during the course of the exchange.

In many exchanges, but not all, one of the exchange days is called a "free day". On that day, only, you and your ambassador(s) may choose to either stay home and relax, or explore a place of mutual interest together. Be flexible. Keep in mind you are representing the USA and your club and you want them to have a positive experience.

It is customary to exchange small gifts (preferably made in the USA) with you ambassadors. Suggested gifts: a picture book of the local or state area, handmade crafts, a tea towel printed with a map of the local area or state, a club baseball cap, or other memorabilia from the local area. In addition to any gifts you provide to your ambassadors, the club will put together a bag with various mementoes, pamphlets, maps, etc.

How Do I Make an Ambassador Comfortable?

It is very important to communicate with your ambassador(s). Once you receive the "match" from your ED, contact the ambassador by email (or snail mail) to invite them to your home. It is customary to tell them about yourself in this introductory email. You might want to attach pictures of yourself and your home in the initial email. If you don't hear from them with a reasonable amount of time, try once more. If you still receive no response, communicate this to the ED.

When you communicate with them, ask them about special interests so that you can plan the free day activity in advance. Let them know if you have WIFI in your home. And let them know whether or not they will be able to use your washer and dryer. It will aid them when they pack for the trip.

Be Sure to Ask Your Ambassadors about Allergies and Physical Limitations

Though they should have, they might not have listed these on their applications. It is also customary to ask them about their food preferences as it relates to breakfasts and lunches. If they are willing to experiment, introduce them to regional foods such as barbeque, fried chicken, etc.

If you have pets let them know what and how many you have. They should have noted any allergies or problems with pets on their applications but you want to make sure this will not be a problem.

Once they arrive at your home, give them a tour. They will be curious about your home, garden, neighborhood, etc. especially if they are from a foreign country. Show them to their room and give them privacy so they can settle in. If it is early in the day, this would be the ideal time to take them to your local supermarket.

At a supermarket let them know what you and the club plan on providing for the week and ask if there are any other items they would like to purchase for the time they will be staying with you. You might also want to ask if your ambassador likes beer, wine or other alcoholic beverages and tell them what you can provide and if they want anything else you will take them to a place where they can purchase them.

After the first breakfast, give them a tour of your kitchen; showing them where the breakfast food is, where the plates, cups, etc. are, and how to operate the microwave, the toaster, coffee maker, etc. Most Friendship Force members understand they will be on their own for the rest of their stay, unless you offer a special hot breakfast, i.e. bacon and eggs, or other option. Again, remember you are not expected to be a B&B.

After a busy day's activities, take your cues from your ambassadors. They will be with you 24 hours a day. If they need "space" and alone time, so be it.

Have fun sharing your community, your country, and your culture. Compare and contrast differences and similarities. In our area, a trip to Walmart, Costco, and even Lowe's are an adventure. If they like to garden, a trip to a local nursery will fascinate them. An avid reader would love to visit your local library or one of the many bookstores in and around Charlottesville.

Home hosting need not be complicated. Above all, relax and enjoy this unique experience of learning about another culture or part of our country, and sharing your lifestyle with them.



He enjoyed his time when he went home, with school, friends, his brother and sister, and family....even getting to see some of his camp family. Around Nov, timeframe he began the battle once again, sent me his scans and we made attempts at getting him back here, but unsuccessful. He started chemo around Jan - Feb timeframe, but it progressed. He and I have been communicating almost daily, until last Saturday when he told me that everything was going to be okay. 

<u>Attendance</u>: President David Burns, First Vice President Al Colville, Second Vice President Dale Walden and Secretary Margaret Dryer. Committee Chairs: Peggy Colville, Rob Beck, Linda Burns Walt O'Connell and Paul Hokanson.

<u>Call to Order:</u> A quorum being present the meeting was called to order at 2:15pm by President David Burns. He thanked Walt for a great Ambassador and Paul and Pam for the article they wrote for the Ambassador.

Treasurer Report: There was no report.

Secretary Report: The minutes from the April 14, 2015 were adopted.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

2016 Exchanges: The proposed Russian outbound has not contacted us. The Medicine Hat Club form Alberta, Canada is planing to come in the spring (May-June) of 2016.

<u>Bylaws, Procedures Manual:</u> Chair Margaret Dryer informed the Board that no further changes will be made in either Bylaws or Procedures Manuel until we have been incorporated and have non profit status.

<u>Compensation:</u> The president presented for discussion the possible compensation for hosting and exchange director activities. The subject was discussed and will be addressed again once FFCV becomes incorporated.
