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F/F Journey to Central Virginia, Central North Carolina & Baton Rouge, Louisiana, USA

Our flights took us from Bundaberg to Brisbane, Los Angeles, Washington DC, then Charlottesville, Virginia, with a flying time of almost 18 hours and around nine hours waiting in airports, so we were a little tired at the commencement of our first of three stays.

There were nine of us on the journey, although we travelled independently to our arrival destinations, six members of Bundaberg F/F and three from Adelaide F/F, who quickly jelled together.

All three clubs had quite full itineraries for us to pursue, with lots of social activities, many winery visits, many homes of famous American politicians and statesmen, and we now have a much better understanding of the Civil War.

All of our hosts went out of their way to ensure we had a wonderful time, and nothing was too much trouble. Our first club based around Charlottesville, took us to Tuckahoe Plantation, the original boyhood home of Thomas Jefferson, constructed in 1733.

The following day we were taken to Lexington to the Virginia Military Academy and Lee Chapel and Museum, for a very informative visit.

Thomas Jefferson's Monticello, his home constructed and extended by he and his 600 slaves over 40 years, was truly magnificent. The same day we visited Carter's Mountain Orchard, growing apples, peaches, cherries and all sorts of pumpkins, as well as apple cider, for a delightful lunch with a view.

Thankfully the club had built in a rest day on Saturday, then Sunday we were off then underground at Luray Caverns, fabulous tour!

Another early start, this time to the University of Virginia built by Thomas Jefferson in his later years, a true statesman who left behind a wonderful legacy. A mayoral reception in the Council chambers, a farewell dinner at Spring Creek Tavern on the Green, for our last night.

Our hosts in this club resided on one of 4,200 homes on half acre blocks amongst the trees in a gated community, surrounding Lake Monticello, on which we did a couple of punt tours with club members. The following day we said our sad farewells to our hosts, whom we hope to see in 2019 when their club returns our visit and come to Bundaberg, and we boarded our Amtrak train to Greensboro, North Carolina.

Our second hosts collected us at the railway, and took us to their home, and the following day our program commenced with a welcome brunch, where we played a game of cards to find our seating companions. We then visited Reynolda House & Gardens and Museum of American Art built in 1917 as the home of R J Reynolds of Winston-Salem fame, a tobacco baron, which was initially on 1000 acres, encompassing an entire village for its workers.

The following day we visited the Old Salem Visitors Centre to view a video, then a tour of a museum of early southern decorative arts, and the Moravian Church Township. That was the day that hurricane Michael decided to pay us a visit, but it passed by in around three hours whilst we were taking a nap, with only one large tree crashing down a our host's property, flattening a section of fence. It did leave around 492,000 homes without power, and some of our group were without power for the majority of their stay.

Another early start to for a Quaker history talk, to follow their migration from Pennsylvania and Virginia in 1740 to Guildford County, which quickly became a leading centre of Quakerism. They are pacifists, anti-slavery, and from a very early point, advocates for social justice.

Two consecutive nights in a row we attended the famous North Carolina Theatre, firstly to see the Piedmont Land Conservancy Land Jam, a fabulous evening of entertainment by the Steep Canyon Rangers, Darrell Scott and Laurelyn Dossett, and the following night to witness the Fred Astaire live dance performance of WOW! with 61 individual dance performances, by about 75 participants!

A memorable visit was to the Civil Rights Museum in the old Woolworths store where four college freshmen sat down in the "whites only" lunch counter and challenged the institution of segregation, and it is said that the courageous actions of these men ignited a movement that changed a nation and inspired the world, a superb museum and tour!

The majority of our group then flew to Memphis for two nights in hotel accommodation taking in a day visit to Elvis Presley's Graceland home, which is apparently the second most popular house in America after the White House, according to our bus driver!

This proved to be a good break and a rest whilst taking in some of the Mississippi River history, and some of the Memphis music scene dining at the Jerry Lee Lewis Diner called the Drunken Chook, whilst listening to a great live rock band!

Limo ride back to Memphis Airport, return to Atlanta Airport to change planes, and south to Baton Rouge for our final week with our hosts. And if we ever get the last row of seats in another plane, we will protest, as our domestic flights found us in the last two rows on all flights!

Arrival in Baton Rouge to a big F/F banner in the airport at 5pm, home for a quick tub then off to a huge Lutheran Church for our welcome social attended by about 65 members including the Cajun Steppers Dancers, who took us through second line dance, conga line and line dancing, as well as a smorgasbord.

Next morning off to Alma Plantation, a working sugar mill that processes sugan cane from 470,000 acres, that don't do public tours, but the F/F connection made it possible! Did a tour through the West Baton Rouge Sugar Museum as well, then onto the banks of the Mississippi River for a view towards Baton Rouge.

Following day we were taken to Houmas House Plantation & Gardens for a tour and a lovely smorgasbord lunch of a lot of local foods. This was a sugar baron's home which had 550 slaves for production.

Sunday to the House of Blues Gospel Brunch for fantastic entertainment and a smorgasbord, then walked the French Quarter in New Orleans. Baton Rouge F/F club has a Friendship Forrest where we had a tree planting and dedication there the following day, and a BBQ on the lake, and we got to play bean bag toss and take a walk.

A highlight with the club was a swamp tour with Champagne Cajun Boat Tours for 1 1/2 hours, which was very informative although because it was overcast, there were only two alligators to be seen, but many birds!

Baton Rouge has a lady mayor and we were treated like royalty at a meeting with her in the City Hall, presented with certificates of our visit, participated in a flag raising ceremony, sang our National Anthem, and had our photographs taken. We then visited the current State Capital Building completed in 1932 and at 450' tall and 34 stories, it is the tallest state capital in America!

On our departure day we were taken to New Orleans once again, to visit the WW2 Museum for four hours which explained America's involvement in the second world war, which was again excellent. Dropped at the Louis Armstrong New Orleans International Airport for the commencement of our trek home, from what has been a very memorable and exciting exchange with fantastic people, over 3.5 weeks!

One thing that does come to mind is that each journey co-ordinator in the three host clubs had a solid committee of four to six people assisting in making these journeys function so well! A very memorable exchange with terrific hosts and club member's involvement!!!

Getting an Outbound Journey

Speaking as the Friendship Force International (FFI) Field Rep for the Northeast and Mid-Atlantic Region, and not just as a member of Friendship Force of Central Virginia (FFCV) I'd like to pass on some information regarding matching outbound journeys that I've shared with your BOD and other clubs in our region. First off, getting the journeys you want is not as simple as you think. Each year by November 1, your club is required to send in your "wish list" for journeys two years out. For example, the lists submitted recently were for journeys in 2020, matches for 2019 were selected a year ago. There are certain rules, some official, some not that FFI takes into consideration with assigning outbound exchanges, some of the more important ones are:

- ✓ If you have visited a country or area, especially a club in Europe, in the last three years you will not get another journey there.
- ✓ Many of the more desirable countries have very few clubs located in them, most only one, and many, many clubs try to go to them.
- ✓ All clubs, including ours, are required to submit their inbound requests by August and can comment on who they are willing to host. To be honest, many international clubs prefer hosting clubs from other than the U.S. for the simple reason that they can visit the U.S. with ease, but not Guadeloupe, New Caledonia, South Africa, South America, Thailand, and so on. These they want to host, not the U.S., as they hope to have reciprocal visits.

- ✓ In the past many clubs were making "deals" for agreed upon journeys and stated this on their inbound and outbound requests, FFI usually blessed these agreements. This essentially blocked anybody from getting those assignments. After 2020, FFI will not recognize these agreements.
- ✓ That said, if a club say one in Israel (by the way only one club there) goes to Atlanta this year, then Atlanta will have preference in going there in 2020. This is considered a reciprocal journey and happens a lot.

Along with the outbound request form your club must be submit by November, there is another working aid that tells the clubs what countries have clubs, how many are located there, the maximum number of ambassadors they can host, and how many journeys they will accept. This is to give the clubs an idea of their chances of getting a journey to a given country. Analysis of this information reflects the following which I have passed to your and other club BODs which I will share with you.

- ✓ If you have gone to a geographical area such as Europe or Taiwan in the past 3 years you likely will not get another journey there in 2020.
- ✓ If you limit your choices to countries that have only 1 or less than 5 clubs your chances of getting them is not real good.
- ✓ I have broken down international destinations into five "tiers" based on the number of clubs in their country (see below).
- ✓ Suggest your choices include at least one country in what I call Tier 1 or 2, and the other(s) in the other three; I would not recommend two in Tier 5.
- ✓ Please note the Netherlands were not going to host anybody in 2019 and were evaluating their future plans.
- ✓ There is nothing that says you cannot put in for two or more sets of destinations and only accept one if you are lucky enough to get more. If you do put in for two journeys, include different destinations.



We are looking forward to hearing from you.


Do you need a name tag or husiness cards?


